#### **WORKING TOOLS - THE TRAVELING MASON**



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### MASONIC EDUCATION

In this issue, beginning our new Masonic year, we thought that it would be good time to review some of the "Most Common Errors in Lodge".

Our Ritual, Protocol and Etiquette are key elements in communicating our Masonic tradition.

- 1. When giving the Signs. The complete signs as demonstrated in the secret work in all degrees should be the ones used in Lodge. That is the step and the full sign, not one without the other as we often see.
- 2. When doing a piece of work, speak up. The degree should be audible for all Brethren present to enjoy. Whispers are only used in giving the passwords.
- 3. The Worshipful Master is always referred to as Worshipful Master when being addressed in a Lodge not Worshipful Sir except when directed in the Book of Work. (Remember, there is only one Worshipful Master, but there may be several Worshipful Sirs present).
- 4. When wishing to address the Worshipful Master, rise and wait to be recognized.
- 5. The Worshipful Master, as well as all Brethren must rise for the reception of all visitors entering and being introduced into Lodge.
- 6. The Worshipful Master always participates in giving of The Grand Honours.
- 7. When giving Grand Honours, after the final clap over the head, do not slap the thighs again, but just lower the hands and then give the claps. Slapping the thighs is the start of the Grand Honours, not the end.
- 8. There is no requirement to bend the head forward when saying, "So mote it be."
- 9. Do not pat the chest when taking the "Sign of Fidelity" and saying and may God be with you during the closing.
- 10. The VOSL is not closed till after the Lodge is closed and the lights extinguished, and then only by a Past Master.














## Our Public Open House
