Our New W.M.

W. Bro. Ulysses Toledo



My first grader teacher used to call me Ulysses Toledo. My family and friends call me Ully but in Freemasonry they call me Brother. I was born and raised in the northern part of the Philippines. My wife Annabelle and I were blessed with three kids, a boy and 2 girls; Anthony Toledo 15, Camille Toledo 11, and Dominique Toledo 8.

My masonic journey started after the burial of my wife's grandfather in May 2008. He was a member of the craft for 56 years back in the Philippines before he dropped his working tools, but he never affiliated with any lodge(s) here in Canada particularly in Toronto area. At the restaurant after the burial, two fine gentlemen were having a conversation about Freemasonry. As they were close by, I could not help but overhear, and one phrase in particular caught my attention, "A mason never look down. The only time he looks down is when he helps you to stand up". Before I went to bed that night, I turned on the computer and begin searching about Freemasonry, but unfortunately, I didn't get enough answers to my questions. But the research didn't stop that night. One sunny Saturday afternoon, in July 2008, I met a gentlemen, a Mason, and I asked him some questions about Freemasonry. He explained all very well and answered all my questions. Before we parted ways on that day, he advised me to find a lodge and I started looking for what he called "Lodge". Unfortunately, I wasn't lucky enough to find the door of that "Lodge".

Since I was busy with my family life and work, it took me 4 years to find a "Lodge". October 2012, a brother Mason introduced me to R. W. Bro. Ross Guerrero. Don Livingstone regarding my initiation date. I was initiated on the emergent meeting of December 2012. On the regular meeting of January, I met W. Bro. Danilo Vitto who helped me with most of my memory work to become an Entered Apprentice. I took my oath, the Fellowcraft Obligation, during the emergent meeting of March and I was Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on May 29, 2013. Both R. W. Bro Ross Guerrero and W. Bro. Danilo Vitto were patiently mentoring and guiding me through this whole process, and they continue to advise me even now.

My Masonic journey continued when on December 02, 2015, I was exalted to the Supreme Degree of the Holy Royal Arch of Jerusalem (R.A.M.). I received my 14 th degree at the Scottish Rite at the Lodge of Perfection of Valley of Toronto on January 10, 2017, my 18 th degree was obtained on April 16, 2017 at the Toronto Sovereign Chapter Rose Croix of Valley of Toronto, both at the York Temple. I finished the 32 nd degree of Moore Sovereign Consistory of Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry at the Hamilton Valley.

It is a great honour for me to sit at the chair of King Solomon as the 194 th Worshipful Master of Richmond Lodge #23. I understand that I will encounter many challenges but with the assistance of the officers and members of the Lodge, I certainly know that there is no objective we can't accomplish and no obstacle we can't overcome together.
